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

OUR JANUARY DEMONSTRATOR IS JIM PIPER!





Jim Piper is our first demonstrator of 2024. He's an amazing wood artist, has been on the cover of the *American Woodturner*, and has received a bunch of honors for his turning and embellishment.

When I asked him what he would demonstrate Jim wrote:

"I'd like to start by showing a few photos of my work, and talking about what inspires me in both form and texture, and how I use unexpected and unlikely inspirations. For example: an upturned barrel cactus in the Grand Canyon; Eroded sandstone. A fallen bird's nest inspired the top of a box for a show "Boxes to Die For" that I was invited to show in.

Several years ago I was inspired to discover some of the Whys of Woodturning - otherwise referred to as The Physics of



Woodturning. I think it will benefit everyone. For example: why we are attracted to one form over another. Richard Raffan

refers to a chain suspended from two points, and how and why it creates a beautiful, more comfortable curve to follow. When that curve is turned 90 degrees, it creates a beautiful vessel or bowl profile.

Max Brosi leaves a curve no more

than a mm in height in a textured surface to define a beautiful sweeping curve around a vessel. Avelino Samuels carves very symmetrical spiral curves with much more depth. Both are

equally beautiful, organic forms.

I will have tools to demonstrate

most of the textures I like to create. Outlining with a wood burner, creating more depth with a rotary carver and refining the details with a wood burner.

In addition, I will have paints and brushes to show depth and detail of carving, and why the shape of the brush is important."

VIDEOGRAPHERS NEEDED FOR THE AAW SYMPOSIUM



2024 Symposium

The 2024 show will be at the Oregon Convention Center as it was in 2017. There will be 9 demo rooms - 2 Live Demo rooms that go on-air, and 7 standard demo rooms. The AAW videography team will interview and select the videographers - see schedule below. Technical knowledge will be part of the interview process.

Videographers Benefits

- Selected videographers receive free admission to the symposium, banquet, and a t-shirt.
- A total of 24-26 videographers are needed.

Videographer Show Requirements

- *Wednesday* Unpacking of equipment and setup of the rooms. Not everyone is required.
- Thursday Mandatory training on the boom cameras and the switcher. Everyone is required to attend.
- Friday Sunday Show. Must do a minimum of 6 rotations.
- Sunday Afternoon Teardown. The more we have the faster it will go.

Videography Volunteers Timeline

- **December 15 February 1** application process opens. Link to the application will be on the AAW website and sent out to the membership.
- **February** applications are called by the AAW team for a short interview.
- Approximately around the first of April Applicants will be notified if they ae selected or not.

Details of the Job

There will be 9 demo rooms including discussion rooms. 2 of the 9 rooms are live. There are a total of 90 demos for 10 rotations. 20 demos will be in the two Live rooms – 12 videographers. The remaining 7 demo rooms with 70 demos will need 12 to 14 videographers.

Two Live Rooms - 4 teams/3 people per team = 12 Videographers

These rooms are broadcast live worldwide.

- Boom Operator operates the boom camera.
- Audience Camera stationary camera
- Switcher operator controls what goes to air
- Audience monitor (Chat) Monitors audience feedback and answers questions or passes the question to the demonstrator.

Seven Demo Rooms - 1 videographer per demo = 12-14 Videographers for 70 demos

Each room just has a boom camera, and two large monitors. There will be a room helper volunteer who is not a videographer.

• Boom Operator - operates the boom camera.

Volunteer Requitements

- **Boom Operator** Looking for experienced camera operators. The boom will require training and practice which will occur on the Thursday before the show.
- Switcher Operator (Live Rooms Only) Minimal technical knowledge required but knowledge of turning is required. Switcher orientation will occur on the Thursday before the show.
- Audience Monitor (Live Rooms Only) Knowledge of turning required. They will monitor the on-line Chat and answer questions or pass them on to the demonstrator. Minimal technical knowledge required.

ORDINARY THINGS



spend most of my time in my shop making ordinary things, which are most definitely *not* gallery-quality things. These ordinary things are usually gifts and stuff that family and friends ask me to make. I love doing them, but since they are not the sort of thing that gets written up in the *American Woodturner*, I thought I would write about a few for this newsletter.

A couple of weeks before Christmas I got a text from a daughter-in-law who shared a secret: her children were getting a hamster from Santa! She wanted to know if I would like to secretly make a house for the hamster and provide it to Santa before Christmas. Of course I said "yes," but then I had to

figure out how to do that.

I didn't know much about hamsters, but Google came to my aid. Hamsters are nocturnal and they like to sleep in the dark during the day, so my hamster house

should have a small door and no windows. They like to burrow into shavings where they sleep, so my hamster house needed to be tall enough to accommodate shavings. It also needed to allow my grandkids to get rid of dirty old shavings and put in clean, new ones. I wanted the grandkids to be able to take a look at the hamster when it was trying to sleep in its house, so my hamster house needed a removable roof.



Hamsters also tend to chew on anything that is chewable, including their wooden houses.

From Google came these design criteria: a bottomless house with a removable top, small door, no windows, and

unfinished, non-toxic wood. All I needed to add was an architectural style.



I went for "Fairy Tale," and made my hamster house look like a fat mushroom. I made the cap removable, like the lid on a turned box, and I made the stem like a bottomless tube, so the dirty shavings would stay in the cage when the grandkids picked up the whole house. Google also told me that hamsters can use toilet paper tubes as tunnels, so I measured the inside diameter of a toilet paper tube, and used a forstner bit about that to size to drill the door.

I guess it was a success. When my grandkids put the mushroom house in the hamster cage the hamster checked it out, crawled in, and went to sleep.

While continually learning the craft I have been able to use what I've learned to produce pieces that

My demo will show how I approach a piece of wood to make a natural edge form. I'll take you through the process from log to the finished piece. There are many ways to get to the finished result and I don't claim to have the definitive method.

The process I employ is what has grown organically from my



many attempts to create these pieces. Hopefully some of it will help you in your journey towards the finished piece you have in your minds eye."


Most recent board meetings:
