

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OUR SEPTEMBER DEMONSTRATOR



David Williams will be Cascade's September demonstrator. He's an architect who turns *really interesting* pieces. He writes:

I will demonstrate the vessels and the unique properties and technique of using stabilized wood. I have made these vessels over the years and frequently with stabilized wood. Four of the ones shown are stabilized. The appeal is unusual colors as well as being basically impervious to water and consistently solid material. I usually use African Blackwood finials for contrast.

(The tallest vessel in the picture immediately below is about 5" high without the finial.)



The SPOTLIGHT is on....GARY BORDERS!





Gary has BS & MS degrees in computer science engineering from California State University (Chico State). He started at Lockheed as an orbit analyst. After completing his Masters degree he was hired by Hewlett-Packard and moved from Sunnyvale to Roseville, to Vancouver where he headed an engineering department. Gary retired in 2012 after 33 years with HP. During that time he served 25 years on the board at "Chico State" and was honored as "Distinguished Alumnus in 1996."

I've come to realize that not every person who joins a woodturning club becomes proficient in turning to do production work or artistic pieces, but it does not diminish what skills they might bring to a club that will help round out the many jobs that are needed for a club to function at a higher level than just being a place to gather for monthly meetings. Gary is just that unique person who has the knowledge and ability to assess what is needed for the long haul and the skill to bring it to fruition.

Gary stepped into the leadership position which put him in charge (so to speak) as a 2-term President, and master organizer who guided our club through the Covid pandemic and

the start of ZOOM demonstrations and meetings. This was no small task, but one that he did not shirk. He was the right person to lead us through the many hurdles we had to navigate: 1) securing a new location for our meetings that would be a reasonable price, and could accommodate our membership, and secure storage of our equipment, 2) researching new electronic equipment and forming a small team to learn ZOOM and the set-up and coordination of this new equipment along with some of our older AV pieces. Here he called upon Steve Walgrave and Harvey Rogers as part of this "brain trust", and then myself (VP) as their cheerleader, since I had no real technical knowledge to add to their conversations, and 3) sorting thru many Zoom presenters to





find ones who could do a good ZOOM presentation and have it be an overall decent educating experience for the members.

Gary has also had an interest in woodworking and has taken classes under Gary Rogowski in fine furniture making at the Northwest Woodworking Studio. To attest to his skill and determination, he made a 6-foot long Asian inspired garden bench which is displayed in Gary's & Adrienne's entry hall at their home. Also, he has a work in progress where he has built 3 screens that slide across the underside of his deck hiding various items that one hides under their deck. Did I mention that he is also perfecting his CNC router skills with this project!




Lastly, Gary's latest excursion into woodturning has taken him to Ireland for a class with Glenn Lucas, a world

IT HAPPENED IN AN INSTANT

It happened in an instant"- words too often spoken after an accident. In this case, they were spoken by a Florida based artist that I follow on Instagram.

I'll let Scott (@ncwoodsmith) describe the accident in his own words (with permission), "One week ago today, I nearly amputated my arm doing what I am doing here [the video

accompanying this post on Instagram shows Scott using an angle grinder with a 4" carbide toothed wheel to carve out the inside of a large mahogany bowl].



I was working on this large live-edge mahogany centerpiece when, best I can tell because it happened so fast, the grinder and its extra coarse carbide wheel had some unexpected kickback. The tool spun counterclockwise from my perspective and the spiky carbide wheel found purchase on the tight nylon sleeve I was wearing. They key point is these sleeves are designed not to tear, (a fact I learned that day) so it wound around the wheel. Now powering down, the muscle in my right forearm provided little resistance to the aggressive carving wheel, and the sleeve pulled it tight into my flesh.

So I went from doing something I've done a hundred times to seeing my grinder flop over, still tangled in the sleeve, exposing a gaping hole in my arm that rapidly filled with blood. I tried tearing the grinder off, but that damned fabric! I peeled it off my arm, grinder still tangled in the sleeve. A stream of curses seemed appropriate at that time. I took off my other nylon sleeve and, after a few failed tries using my non-dominant hand and my teeth, I got a tourniquet on above my elbow. It didn't seem to stop the flow, so I went into the shop and found another sleeve for a second tourniquet, leaving a trail and puddles of blood along the way. Lots and lots of blood.

Second tourniquet helped, but not much. I went back outside and sat in a chair, started making calls. First to my ex, telling her she needed to pick up our daughter from school. She said I sounded very weird. I called my kids, asking for a ride to the ER..." At this point, I was going into shock and was losing feeling in my hands and feet. My right hand was folding in on itself and I couldn't move it.



I elevated my arm on a vertical floor fan, blood pouring over it. I remembered the tourniquet, forgot all about compression! Fading fast, I called 911 and about 5 minutes later, I heard a firefighter say, 'he's back here!' It was a surreal ride to the ER with the medics praising my tourniquets while applying a real one higher up, at the base of my deltoid. "Am I going to loose my arm?' 'Too early to say" was the reply. So, long story short, no. I got to keep my arm. I'm floored that I'm back at it a week later. I'll admit, I had to psych myself up a bit to get there, having just removed the bloody sleeve from my grinder. It had tangled all the way into the motor housing. Good news is, I got through it with no

further would-be mortal wounds..."

Scott refers to himself as a "recovering newspaper journalist" and is a full-time wood artist, relying on the vibrant Florida art show scene to make his living. In this incident, Scott was using a grinding wheel that is generally regarded as safe and the sleeves he was wearing to protect his forearms from flying chips were tight fitting, not loose. It is difficult to say what happened in this situation.

I will offer a reminder to always follow too manufacturers instructions and, if a tool comes with an accessory handle, use it. If it is a two-handed tool, keep both hands firmly on the tool until it comes to a complete stop. In the case of the sleeves, I will always think of this incident when I consider if the protection provided by piece of gear is worth the potential danger it may pose if things go wrong.





When – dates: 6-9th Oct 2023 time: 9am – 5pm (bring your own lunch) What – We will be running four one-day classes with a maximum of 10 students per day. You can sign up for 1 or more classes depending on your budget and how much you want to achieve.

Fee – 1 day - \$100; 2 days - \$190; 3 days - \$280; 4 days - \$370 Class Description – You will be lead through the fundamentals of spindle and faceplate turning and a wide variety of surface embellishment possibilities. You will be able to determine your own projects, with guidance if needed from Graeme & Melissa on possibilities to suit individual skill levels.

Graeme will start the days getting the less experienced turners going with simple spindle turned forms (spheres & eggs to practice tool skills) and simple bowls. Your turnings will then become canvases to explore a range a surface treatments, carving/texturing with rotary and hand tools, texturing with wood burners, colouring and finishing techniques.

More experienced turners who can produce a form quickly, or who may prefer to bring pre-turned pieces or test boards, can go straight into surface embellishment with Melissa. As the days progress Graeme will cross over to surface techniques as well as assisting on turning where needed and Melissa will continue with surface techniques and helping those whose projects are ready for coloring/finishing.

This class will cover design and influences, how to come up with ideas to decorate and personalize your turnings, wood selection, preparation and drying, turning/embellishment/finishing techniques, tool selection, sharpening and safety.

A tip from Starbond the cyanoacrylate glue maker:

Painter's tape, also known as blue tape, can be used to make a costeffective double-sided tape when combined with CA glue. This is especially useful when working on projects that require precise alignment or when traditional double-sided tape would leave a residue.

To make double-sided tape using painter's tape and CA glue, apply a strip of tape to each surface that needs to be joined. Ensure that the strips are slightly longer than the area of contact between the two pieces.

Next, apply a small amount of CA glue to one of the strips of tape. Be careful not to use too much glue. Then, carefully align the two pieces of material and press them together firmly. The glue will bond the two pieces together, creating a strong hold.

Once the glue has cured, usually within a few seconds, you can get to work!


the firefighter breezed by us with a glance at our display (and a comment to make sure our fire extinguisher was re-certified regularly).

THE GORGE MAKER SPACE



Alittle bit about us - The Gorge Maker Space is a nonprofit community resource in White Salmon Washington. GMS provides classes, workshops and open studios for youth and adults in a variety of media and formats.

For the kids, there are (among other things) STEM offerings, robotics, invention club, and lots of summer camps including macgivering, woodturning, painting. For adults there are classes including furniture making, basic construction, woodturning, blacksmithing and a number of open studio days where participants can work on their own projects with guidance.

In particular, the woodturning program started when the Bree Landers Foundation donated five mini lathes, chucks and tools to GMS. Subsequently, we have acquired 4 Jet midi lathes and a Jet 16/40 through AAW grants and local donations. In the fall, winter and spring, we offer bi monthly four week beginner classes; in the summer, we run a couple of week long kids turning camps, and year-round, we offer a Sunday open studio for advanced beginner and intermediate turners. And quite surprisingly, 90 per cent of our adult turners are women!

We would also like to thank both the Cascade Woodturners and Northwest woodturners for donating wood to us - especially as we provide wood for all the camps, classes and most open studio projects. This has been really helpful as my time is generally better spent teaching than constantly sourcing wood for students. Going forward, we hope to acquire a couple more lathes, more tools and start hosting some outside demonstrators (as currently I demo most everything people want to learn).

"It is a sad day for our friends the trees when we have to protect them from THIEVES.

This is a note to ask all our members and friends who work with wood and especially burls to be on the lookout for anyone offering to sell burls. If you are contacted, please use the police phone number listed below to call it in.

This link will take you to the KGW article about Thieves stealing Burls from the Corvallis City Park. They have taken something like 29 Burls off of live Maples. As noted in the article, this theft will likely cause the death of these trees. These are some big old trees,



that should be able to live much longer lives. This is meaningless destruction for selfish profiteering. I can only wish the same could be done to these creeps.


Cascade supports its activities with member dues, which are \$35 a year. You can become a member of Cascade on our website by clicking here. Members receive some benefits that are not available to the general public.


