Inspiration (and curiosity) is the root of all Woodturning

We all enjoy looking at the work of other woodturners; imposing our own critique, deciding what we like or dislike about each piece. Is the form pleasing? The wood interesting? The texture integrated with the form? Maybe it's the simplicity of a wood bowl that calls to us. Do we wonder what inspired the Maker? How often do we ask about the source of inspiration?

When I began woodturning, I was inspired just watching the chips fly. I think we all were. Most of us still are. Glenn Lucas' chips fly into dumpsters (saves a lot of time cleaning up when you turn as many bowls as he does.)

I don't turn enough to generate massive piles of chips but what I do turn inspires me. I strive to make the most pleasing and complete form that will stand alone, or allow me to embellish it with inspiration garnered, most often, from elements I find in nature. A beautiful form always brings me great pleasure.

Much of Clay Foster's work has been inspired by historic architecture. Kristin Levier's work reflects her years as a research molecular biologist. Graeme Priddle's cultural heritage and elements of the sea near his New Zealand home have influenced his forms and surfaces.

As this year comes to a close, one of my ongoing sources of inspiration as a woodturner and artist, is my membership in AAW and the opportunities it offers. The more time I spend at the Symposium, talking to other woodturners and attending programs, the more I am inspired to be in my shop.

SAFETY FIRST

IT ISN'T WHAT YOU HAVE, IT'S HOW YOU USE WHAT YOU HAVE GOT.

If you haven't wandered around YouTube looking at woodturning videos, you might want to try it. The whole world of woodturners is shown, including the wonderful, the skilled, the careful and the thoughtful. Unfortunately there's also a liberal sprinkling of the clueless, the foolish and the amazingly inept. You can find all kinds by going to youtube.com and typing "woodturning" in the search box at the top. I just did that and found about 368,000 videos.

If you don't want to look at videos by the clueless, the foolish or the amazingly inept, you can check out AAW video library. It has a lot less than 368,000 videos, but they cover a wide variety of topics, and they have all been reviewed by the AAW safety committee for compliance with minimum safety standards. You can view the AAW video library at http://aawvideosource.org.

I, however, was cruising around YouTube eagerly seeking videos by the clueless, the foolish or amazingly inept, hoping those videos might give me the inspiration I needed to write this article on woodturning safety.

I thought the search spirits had blessed me when I found a video titled: "Awesome Extreme Woodworking Largest Wood Lathe Work - Dangerous Biggest Wood Lathe Chainsaw Work."

"Perfect!" I said to myself. "I'll watch this and write about the appalling things I see in the video."

Then I watched it.

Curses; foiled again!

This is a video taken somewhere in Asia that shows people making a living turning a log of tropical hardwood into a huge, shapely pillar, or maybe a vase. Their equipment is rudimentary, and the log is so big and heavy they easily could have injured or killed someone.



But they didn't. They didn't because they are careful. Given their circumstances, they were turning pretty safely.

Here's some of the safe things they did:

- 1. They carefully mounted the log on the lathe, using rollers, pry bars and a chain hoist. While they moved quickly, they avoided being where the log might roll unexpectedly.
- 2. They made sure the log was securely mounted in the lathe before they turned it on.
- 3. They were appropriate protective clothing. When the spinning log was throwing bark and junk toward the turner they were goggles, gloves and heavy clothing.
- 4. They used a very sturdy tool rest, and kept it close to the spinning log. Their tools did not hang far over the rest.
- 5. Their tools had long handles to help counteract the enormous force of the spinning log.
- 6. In spite of the fact that they had a very large amount of wood to remove, they were patient and took safe, relatively light cuts.
- 7. They did not touch the spinning log with their hands.

The video was *so* disappointing. Nothing in it gave me the horrific bad example I needed for my article.

I started to sulk and then it hit me. This video is a great example of how we can all do impressive, potentially dangerous stuff with simple equipment, and still be pretty safe. Like some other wonderful things in life, woodturning safety depends much less on the equipment you have got, and much more on how you use that equipment.

The video is at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Kk9jVlFzctU&t=905s. It is 22.29 minutes long. If you don't feel like watching the whole thing, check them out moving the log to the lathe (about 1:29), mounting the log on the lathe (about 2:39), rotating the log to make sure it clears the tool rest and bed and starting turning (about 7:52), wearing appropriate protective gear (about 12:17), and shaping the form (about 20:13).

If nothing else it will make you glad you don't have to earn your living turning logs into pillars. The folks in the video are working *very hard*.

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
