# SAFETY REMINDER Hot News

Last week we had a 44 degree swing in Portland from one day to the next. **44 degrees!** And the high was **99 degrees**.

My shop does not have air conditioning, but it has been pleasant enough first thing in the morning. By about 11 AM it starts to get warm, and by mid-afternoon it is often too hot for comfort. But of course I *want* to play in my shop. I was about to decide that I should just man up and go play, regardless of the heat, when I Googled "working in hot conditions."

I first found the really bad stuff like heat stroke and heat exhaustion. These are life-threatening, we all should know about them, and you can read more about them here: <a href="https://www.osha.gov/SLTC/heatstress/">https://www.osha.gov/SLTC/heatstress/</a>

But I also found three less serious, but important things that will affect my playing when it is hot in my shop. "Hot" can be subjective, but the stuff I found suggests it is "hot" when it's 80 degrees or more. My shop often gets that hot these days, and it sometimes gets into the 90's.

The first thing I found is that people have to get used to working in the heat. That goes by the fancy word "acclimatization." Acclimatization can take a week or more. While you are getting used to working in the heat, you have to work less. And when the temperature swings rapidly back and forth between hot and cool, like it has recently in Portland, it is harder to get used to

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working in the heat because it isn't always hot. OSHA has a rather frightening statistic for people working outdoors: 50% to 70% of fatalities occur in the first few days of working in warm or hot environments because the body needs to build a tolerance to the heat gradually over time. If we are going to work in our hot shops we need to build up our ability to do that slowly over time.

The second thing I found is also kind of scary. Once it gets hot, as it keeps getting hotter people get weaker, people get more fatigued, and people's accuracy, comprehension and retention decline. As one who already grumbles about being weaker, more fatigued and generally more fuzzy-headed than I used to be, I sure don't want any more of that.

The third thing I found is that working in hot environments is harder on older people. This is *particularly startling*, because getting older pretty much makes everything else better.

In summary, playing in a hot shop around heavy, dangerous equipment can be like voluntarily diving headfirst into temporary senility. Not a good, or a safe, thing to do.

Great Google suggests some simple things you can do to reduce the harmful effects of playing in a shop that is too hot:


- 1. **Build up your ability to play in the heat.** If you aren't used to playing in a hot shop, start out playing significantly less than you want to, and build up your tolerance for the heat slowly. This can take a week or two.
- 2. Pace yourself. Slow down and work at an even pace.
- 3. Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of fluids.
- 4. **Avoid dehydrating liquids.** Alcohol, coffee, tea and caffeinated soft drinks can hurt more than help.
- 5. **Take frequent breaks.** Take time out from playing and rest. Ideally, rest in a cooler place.
- 6. Use a damp rag. Wipe your face with it or put it around your neck.
- 7. **Eat smaller meals.** Eat fruits high in fiber and natural juice. Avoid high protein foods.
- 8. **Stop playing if you feel funny.** If you are playing in your hot shop and something just doesn't seem right, stop, cool off, and think hard about stopping for the day.

While it stays hot I plan to keep playing in my shop, but do more in the early (ugh!) mornings before it gets hot. When I play in the hot afternoons I plan to spend less time than I want, not do as difficult stuff, and quit as soon as I start to feel funny. I feel no need to rush into senility, temporary or otherwise.
