SAFETY REMINDER

Another Opportunity to be Safer

I love tools. I eagerly read "tool porn:" magazines and internet sites with lovely pictures of tools and clever, talented people using them. And the lust those pictures excite make me to buy more tools than I really need.

Some years ago I realized I was getting so many gouges, skews, parting tools and other fun cutting tools that I couldn't just lay them on a bench top. Actually, I really could (and did) just lay them on a bench top for a long time, but then I couldn't really find them, and trying to find them often made me poke my groping had with the sharp ends of the tools.

Finally I searched the American Woodturner site (which used to be a lot harder than it is now), Googled lathe tool racks, and came up with a design. That design used a double rack of tools

mounted on top of a storage chest with wheels. I put the handles down and the tips up so I could see which tool was which. I was quite proud of myself.

Shortly after that I attended a "Gizmos and Gadgets" presentation at an AAW symposium and learned that one should *not* have a double rack of tools with the points facing up, because reaching over the points of the tools in the front rack might cause you to poke your hand or wrist.

I confess I never had that problem until I heard that, and then, after I heard that, I poked myself regularly.


But my tool rack was done, and it otherwise worked great. Still, I always intended to rebuild my rack someday.

We recently moved and built out my new shop. I decided it was time to redo my rack. But first I tried just turning the tools upside down in my old rack. That sort of worked, and it looked like this:



But the way this rack is built, with the tool tips pointing down, I couldn't see the tips of the tools at all, and I was really used to picking a tool by looking at the tip.

So I decided to build a tool rack for the top of my wheeled chest that would still hold a bunch of tools, but let me see the tips. I settled on making a bucket shape out of wood staves. It turns out that a 12" diameter base on the bucket let me put 18 tools around the outside of the bucket, which is only three fewer tools than I had in my old double rack. And I have a bunch more room I can start using inside the bucket.



It sort of works, and again, I was pretty proud of it (just like last time... ②).

Steve Walgrave, our board secretary, is developing a "forum" section for our website. (You can find the new forum section of the website by clicking on "Members Only" at the top of the home page, clicking on "Forums." The tool rack posts are in "Q and A.")

I was helping test the "forum" section by posting something about my new tool rack. Steve kindly and quickly posted a picture of what he uses. Steve puts his tools into a rack on the side of the chest, with the points down. His tool rack is safe (no points to poke a groping hand), and handy, because it is mounted on a wheeled chest so he can move it where he wants it. And *he* didn't have to build a staved bucket, which required me to exhume the moldy bits of my high-school trigonometry.



I'm going to add one of those to my wheeled chest. I'll use it to hold the tools I'm currently using for a project, so I don't have to spin my bucket around to find a tool I just put down.

Lathe tool storage perfection clearly continues to elude me, but I keep learning more and more. When I was first reading about turning I learned I shouldn't put my rack of tools behind my lathe, because that makes me reach across the lathe to get a tool. If I got sloppy and didn't shut

off the lathe before I grabbed a new tool, the lathe could do me serious harm. I now think of that as "obvious," but lots of woodturners on YouTube have their tools stored in neat, nicely made racks directly behind their lathes. (They do look great on camera that way.)

That's why my first rack was on a wheeled chest, so I could always move the tools where I can easily grab them, and I don't need to reach across the lathe. But I built my first rack to hold my tools with the points up, and immediately learned that I shouldn't have the points up. It took me years to come up with a better design and the enthusiasm to make it. Of course, as soon as I built the new rack, I found out how to improve it.

FROM THE BOOK CORNER


Greetings fellow woodturners. We have added two books to our collection.


