With the announcement of Dale Larson being selected for recognition by the AAW, I was reminded about a couple of conversations I have had this last year about being a member of AAW.

The first was a discussion with Jim Rogers and Martha Collins while riding in an airport shuttle on the way to the Segmenter's Symposium in St Louis. Both Jim and Martha were presenters at the Symposium. Our backgrounds were very diverse. I am a pure hobbyist with a technical background. Jim is an author, teacher and an officer in the Segmented Chapter. Martha is an artist, teacher and furniture designer/builder. All three of us shared the idea that we would not have arrived at our current woodturning skills without having the gift of knowledge offered by some great people. AAW NEWS

In case you missed it – congratulations to **Dale Larson!** He will be receiving the 2019 AAW Honorary Lifetime Member award at the symposium in Raleigh. This is AAW's highest award. At our November meeting, the Board of Directors unanimously selected Dale for the award. He has done a tremendous amount for AAW as AAW board member, president, board of advisors, and patron, and to promote woodturning in general. No one is more deserving of this award than Dale!

September 5-7, WIT (Women in Turning) Committee of AAW will hold our second EXCHANGE at Arrowmont. Cascade very generously provided a scholarship to cover registration and to help with travel expenses. **Suzanne Jensen** is the recipient of the 2019 scholarship.



We limit the number of participants to 45. Each day, women will work in groups of three with identical bundles of wood. The previous evening, the groups draw two words – a noun and a modifier from two bags of words. It is up to the group to brainstorm, design a piece based on the words they've drawn and then create something using their bundle of wood. We'll have use of all Arrowmont's shop tools and a variety of embellishers such as rotary carvers, burners, piercers, and paint. SAFETY FIRST

Hold On To What You Got

Before I became addicted to woodturning I used to do conventional flatwork. I was really into hand tools and became a devotee of Chris Schwarz, back when he did a lot of writing for *Popular Woodworking* magazine. I ended up buying his book on woodworking benches, and reading as much as I could about what makes a good flatwork workbench.

It turns out that the most important thing a flatwork workbench can do is hold wood so it doesn't move when you try to carve, cut, saw, or whack it. Flatworkers have come up with all sorts of devices to do that, including vices, clamps, holdfasts and dogs.

For woodturners the chuck and the tailstock are the principal workholding devices. They work really well if you use them correctly, and we turners are so used to using them that we may forget how important workholding devices are when you want to carve, cut, saw, or whack a piece of wood that is not on the lathe.

Those of you who were fortunate enough to see Andi Wolfe's demonstrations last month got to see some marvelous turnings that Andi embellished to resemble interesting plant forms.



The embellishment of this piece, which was initially turned as a sphere, clearly required a whole lot of carving, cutting, sawing and whacking.

During Andi's slide show, she paused on a gruesome, close-up picture of the face and neck of a man who had stitches that began near his ear, ran under his jaw, and all the way down to his chin.

He acquired that particular bit of personal embellishment using an angle grinder with a carbide cutter. Lots of people use those tools safely. Angle grinders can cut steel as well as wood, and they have a lot of power. So much power that they come with two handles, because you really should hold them both hands.

The unfortunate soul in Andi's picture decided he needed to use one hand to hold the wood in his lap, so he unscrewed one of the handles on the angle grinder, grabbed the remaining handle, turned the grinder on, applied the spinning carbide disk to the

wood in his lap, and...

Brrrzzpp! The carbide disk grabbed the wood and walked itself right up the man's arm and shoulder to his throat, where it paused briefly in the soft tissue before launching itself into the air.



The man survived. He was lucky.

He clearly should have used both hands to control the angle grinder. But equally clearly, he should not have just cradled the wood in his crotch while he used both hands to guide the angle grinder. That could have cause other, equally appalling soft tissue damage.

To do this kind of heavy carving, you both need to be able to control the carving tool, and you need to hold the wood firmly, so it won't move when you carve, cut, saw, or whack it.

Flatworkers have their vices, clamps, holdfasts and dogs. Those often don't work so well on curvy, turned pieces. But woodturning chucks are designed to hold round wood, and our turnings usually are made so that they can attach firmly to a chuck.

You can, of course, carve, cut, saw, or whack your turning while it sits in the chuck on the lathe. There are at least two potential problems with this. First, that may be hard on your spindle bearings. Second, you have to move around the lathe to get into the right position to make the cuts you want. That can be awkward and difficult. There is a tool that can help.



This device mounts to a workbench, and screws into your chuck where the spindle went. The device can be swivelled, rotated and pivoted so you can move the turning pretty much any way you like to let you make the cuts you want to make. It makes carving a lot easier, not to mention safer.

This particular tool, which I have, is made by Trent Bosch, it works well, but there may be others.


Thank you from the bottom or our hearts for your support, friendship, and business. We have truly enjoyed this adventure. Now it's time to move on to the next one.
