The Instant Gallery at the AAW International Symposium is a must see show. Simply put, you will be amazed. The volume, variety and the quality of work are definitely inspiring. I was staggered the first time I saw the Instant Gallery - still am, and I've been to many Symposiums. Never miss one.

All attendees may bring and display up to three pieces of their work. And if they choose to, they can put a price on their work. Someone may want to take it home.

I'm guessing about thirty five percent of the attendees at the 2017 Kansas City Symposium displayed their work. And there was still over a thousand pieces to see, including work from

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some of the best woodturners from around the world. We can all put our work out to be displayed along with them.

If you are interested in having your work critiqued, you can sign up for a time to have your work reviewed by the critique committee. But be sure and sign up early as they are in great demand. You will get a truly critical perspective that will emphasize the best elements of your work and demonstrate how you may be able to make improvements.

Because I put my work out last year I was offered the cover and inside spread of "American Woodturner". It was truly, the furthest thing from my mind. I merely wanted to share my work with other woodturners at the Symposium. I had no clue I would be sharing in it a worldwide publication.

## **SAFETY FIRST**

#### I WAS SEDUCED!

At his wonderful "40 for \$40" demonstration in April, Dale Larson mentioned that he never turns cracked wood. Dale is a wiser man than I. I never take Dale's advice lightly, but I had extenuating circumstances: I was *seduced*... by a hunk of oak.

About a year ago Howard Borer gave me a couple of large pieces of wet pin oak. I took them home and rough-turned them promptly. I was feeling experimental, so I turned the bowls with large lips. The rough-turned bowls warped as they dried, as wet bowls often do. The trouble was, the lips warped more than any other part of the blank. The smaller blank had no checks or cracks, but the bigger one had a small crack. Remembering what Dale said I decided to throw out the bigger one, and started turning the smaller one.



I first tried to turn the top of the lip flat, so I could plan the shape of the rest of the bowl. But the lip was so badly warped that, by the time the top of it was flat, parts of the lip were too thin to keep. Grumbling, I decided to cut off the lip and make a smaller, conventional bowl. When I was done shaping the smaller bowl I did what Dale showed at his demonstration, oiling the blank

with walnut oil and scraping and sanding it smooth. I was still fretting about the loss of the lip and I wasn't really looking at the bowl. When I took the bowl off the lathe I was surprised to discover that the oiled wood was a beautiful, honey color with lots of the prominent medullary rays that you see in quarter-sawn white oak!



That's when the big, ugly blank with the crack - the one I was supposed to throw out – seduced me.



I could swear I heard it calling to me. I cast my eyes upon it. I coveted its figure. My hands seemed to have a will of their own. They caressed it and - before I really knew what was happening - I mounted the blank. <sup>1</sup> I knew the crack didn't go all the way through. Surely, if I was very careful, I could turn the cracked wood away and have another bowl of beautiful wood. *Surely*.

Despite my lust for that wood, I wasn't completely stupid. I wore my face shield. I rotated the blank by hand before I turned on the lathe. When I did turn on the lathe it was at a very low speed, and I increased the speed slowly. I stood out of the line of fire. I sharpened my gouge frequently, glided its bevel across the wood, and let the sharp edges do the cutting. I decided to turn a relatively thin (for me), shallow bowl so I could remove as much wood as possible where the crack had been.

But the crack was devious and sneaky. As I tried to turn it away, it burrowed deeper into the wood.

I shaped and finished the outside of the bowl first. Then I turned the inside of the bowl in thirds, outer third first and center third last, just like Dale demonstrated. When I turned the outer third down to about a quarter of an inch thick, no crack was visible. Then I turned the middle third and the sound of the spinning blank changed. I stopped the lathe and looked at the partly turned bowl carefully. A hairline crack was just visible in the outer third, right where the old crack used to be.

The American Woodturner (the AAW journal) had an article a few months back about stabilizing cracks in finished pieces using butterflies, wire, staples and such. I decided I would finish the bowl, read the article carefully, and stabilize the crack after I was finished turning. As I hollowed the center third the sound changed again and I felt a pain in my left hand. I shut off the lathe and looked. The side of my hand was cut right where it was bracing the gouge against the tool rest.

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You can see the crack just to the left of the blood. It looks harmless enough in the picture, but when the blank was spinning, the centrifugal force caused the crack to open and the wood on one side to move outward toward me and my hand. That created a sharp edge which happily sliced me.

I finished the bowl anyway, cutting gently and keeping all my body parts away from the spinning wood. The crack continued to open. I applied finish and put it aside to dry. The crack continued to open even more.



Now I have to find that article in the *American Woodturner*. As I said at the beginning, Dale is a wiser man than I.


