SAFETY REMINDER

VOCs

I fantasize that one day I will have happy grandkids playing with me in my shop. Right now they are a bit young, and the pandemic has kept them away anyway.

But to prepare for their eventual arrival, I have been trying to make my shop as safe for them as I can. I'm trying to build safe habits, like remembering to turn off the main power switches on tools so a simple switch flick can't remove a body part. Like putting sharp-edged hand tools in racks or drawers where probing little fingers can't easily cut themselves. Like keeping the dust down to protect their little lungs. I even, occasionally, sweep the floor.

I think I understand how to deal with those kinds of hazards. But I'm really confused about how to deal with finishes that have volatile organic compounds (VOCs).

VOCs are organic compounds that easily release their molecules into the air, where woodturners can breathe them in. VOCs are commonly used as solvents in all kinds of finishes. Wikipedia says the health effects of VOCs include

"...eye, nose, and <u>throat irritation; headaches</u>, loss of coordination, <u>nausea</u>; and <u>damage to the</u> <u>liver</u>, kidney, and <u>central nervous system</u>. Some organics can cause cancer in animals; some are suspected or known to cause cancer in humans. Key signs or symptoms associated with exposure to VOCs include conjunctival irritation, nose and throat discomfort, headache, allergic skin reaction, <u>dyspnea</u>, declines in serum <u>cholinesterase</u> levels, nausea, vomiting, nose bleeding, fatigue, dizziness. The ability of organic chemicals to cause health effects varies greatly from those that are highly toxic, to those with no known health effects. As with other pollutants, the extent and nature of the health effect will depend on many factors including level of exposure and length of time exposed. Eye and respiratory tract irritation, headaches, dizziness, visual disorders, and memory impairment are among the immediate symptoms that some people have experienced soon after exposure to some organics.

In other words, if you must choose between being exposed to VOCs or ice cream, you should definitely pick ice cream.

For woodturning I almost always use walnut oil. It has negligible VOCs, produces a very nice finish, hardens in the wood to make a durable surface, and the leftovers can be used in salad dressing. I'm a big fan of Mike Meredith's products and YouTube videos. Following his advice I rub the walnut oil into the spinning piece, so friction generates heat and the oil hardens.

Recently, however, I've been working on a honey-do flatwood project; it's a wall table that I decided to make from walnut offcuts I had in the shop, since the pandemic kept me from going out to buy wood.

I have learned that all flat surfaces in our house eventually attract coffee cups, wine glasses and other containers that slop liquid onto the flat surfaces. So I wanted a finish for this table that was reasonably resistant to spills. And, of course, I wanted the finish to be reasonably non-toxic when I apply it. I understand that almost all finishes that are now sold in the United States are non-toxic when they are completely dried or cured. But that lack of toxicity only is relevant if you plan to chew on your finished project. I don't plan to chew on this table.

Ordinarily I would have just used Watco Danish Oil even though it has an abundance of VOCs, because I have used it a lot and I like the way it looks. But I couldn't find any in Portland. So I decided to try a low VOC finish that I might be able to use around my grandkids. I thought I would try water-based polyurethane, figuring if it was water-based it wouldn't have any harmful VOCs.

I started with a can of Deft water-based poly. I read the label. It says:

"DO NOT BREATHE VAPOR OR MIST. DO NOT SWALLOW. DO NOT GET IN EYES OR ON SKIN OR CLOTHING. KEEP CONTAINER TIGHTLY CLOSED AND SEALED UNTIL READY FOR USE. PROVIDE FRESH AIR VENTILATION DURING AND AFTER APPLICATION AND DRYING. AVOID THE INHALATION OF DUST, PARTICULATES, SPRAY OR MIST ARISING FROM THE APPLICATION OF THIS PREPARATION. USE PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT AS REQUIRED."

I don't think I will use the leftovers from that can for salad dressing.

I ordered some Minwax water-based, wipe-on poly from Amazon, somehow imagining that it would be better. Apparently not. The label says it contains dimethylethanolamine and 1-methly-2pyrrolidone, has a big warning in an ugly black box, and recommends a NIOSH approved mask if you can't ventilate adequately.

No salad dressing potential for that either.

I finally settled on Sutherland and Welles Ltd's Interior Polymerized Tung Oil, which I found at Woodcrafters in Portland, and says it uses "low toxic mineral spirits and driers." I figured it had to be great because it cost about twice as much as Watco.

When I got home I went to Sutherland and Welles Ltd's website and looked up the product's Safety Data Sheet. It confirms that this product is "minimally toxic," which is, as my step-dad used to say, "better than a poke in the eye with a sharp stick." But not as good as I hoped for, and definitely not suitable for salad dressing. The Safety Data Sheet also suggests using an "air supplied mask" when working in enclosed spaces.

I had to look up "air supplied mask." Apparently that is a mask with a separate supply of breathable air (not just shop air). I didn't remember anything about those, but then I realized that some years ago I had actually used one myself, just not in my shop.



I'm not sure I will add one to my list of "wanted tools," but I can report that the Sutherland and Welles Polymerized Tung Oil does look really nice on walnut, so I'll probably use it on my next flatwood project.



Sadly I'm still confused about how to finish flatwood projects so that my grandkids can play in my shop.
