SAFETY REMINDER

Your Grinder is a Lot Like Your Lathe

A long time ago my "shop" was the space in the basement where I kept the tools I used to try to keep the house from falling apart. Something in the house must have needed grinding because I bought a six-inch, Sears variable speed grinder for that shop; it had half-inch wide wheels, maybe a quarter horsepower on a good day, and half-inch deep grinding platforms that adjusted with a wing nut. But it met the most important criteria for me back then: it was cheap. When I turned it on it sounded like a jet plane that was having trouble taking off. I never paid much attention to that grinder; I just used it to grind stuff.

Some years after that I found "Joe" in the classified ads. "Joe" was my first lathe; a used, wellworn Delta lathe with his name painted in red on the front. After I bought Joe I bought Richard Raffan's first book, and a set of Sears turning tools.

Raffan's book told me that I needed to sharpen my turning tools on a grinder, so I pressed that Sears grinder into service. The platform was so hard to adjust that I just kept it in one position and rested the tool on the edge of the platform, hoping for the best.

I turned simple things on Joe for a few years, and then kids, job and life intervened and I didn't turn for more than a quarter of a century.

When I finally got back into turning I joined the AAW and binge-read most of the *American Woodturners* on the AAW website. I was amazed to read how important sharpening is for good turning, and how elaborate the sharpening rigs of some turners are.

While reading about those rigs and fantasizing about what sharpening tools I might buy, I stumbled across some information about the dangers of grinders. I was startled. My little Sears grinder never hurt me, and I clearly didn't know what I was doing with it. But the more I read the more I realized: there are lots of safety concerns about grinders. I just never thought of them.

Grinders are quite similar to lathes. They have powerful motors that spin things around very fast. Just like a block of wood with a crack can split and hurt you when you spin it on a lathe, a grinding stone that cracks can come flying apart and hurt you. Grinders with cracked wheels may actually be more dangerous than lathes with cracked wood.

If a grinder has a stone-like grinding wheel (an aluminum oxide wheel, for example) the wheel is like a ceramic dinner plate: normally strong enough to put up with all kinds of abuse, but capable of cracking and breaking into sharp, dangerous pieces. When you turn on a grinder with a cracked wheel the centrifugal force can cause the wheel to fly apart. But writers describing this don't say "fly apart." They say "explode."

Seem implausible? Here's a link to a YouTube video of an exploding grinding wheel:

If you use a grinder with a stone-like grinding wheel, you can test the wheel for cracks by "ringing" the wheel. This test apparently isn't 100% effective, but it can help you find a cracked wheel. Here's a YouTube video that shows you how to do that:

This risk of explosion is why grinders have those guards that enclose about 75% of the grinder; they are to contain the shards of the wheel if it explodes. It's also why lots of grinders have little transparent shields to reduce the risk that particles will hit you in the eye.

Explosion is not the only safety risk that you need to mitigate. Stone-like grinding wheels actually shed particles when you grind with them. The particles consist of the abrasive material in the wheel, and some of the binder that sticks the abrasive materials together. Neither type of particle is good for your nose, throat, lungs or eyeballs. And grinders actually grind particles of metal off the tools you grind on them. And the metal particles don't do any good for your nose, throat, lungs or eyeballs either.

So just like when you turn, and particularly if you use a stone-like wheel, when you grind you should:

Try to stand out of the line of fire for the grinder;

Use dust collection, or wear a dust mask; and,

Wear safety glasses or a safety shield to keep the particles out of your eyes.

There's a whole lot more to being safe with a grinder when you are using stone-like wheels. Here's an article I found helpful:

Cubic boron nitride (CBN) grinding wheels are made of metal, so they are not likely to crack the way a stone-like wheel will crack, and they are not likely to explode. So if you are looking for an excuse to change from stone-like wheels to CBN wheels, you can legitimately say that you want to change tools to be safer, because CBN wheels don't explode the way stone-like wheels do.

But even CBN wheels generate particles that are not good for your nose, throat, lungs or eyeballs, so you still should protect those. Doing that makes financial sense, because protecting your nose, throat, lungs and eyeball is much cheaper than replacing them.

Editors P.S.: You can mount a magnet near the radius of the wheel at the lower quadrant of the wheel and most of the pesky metal grinding particles will be collected.

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ByLaws Updated

The ByLaws of Cascade WoodTurners Association have been updated allow for multiple member levels, those being: General, Student, Family and Lifetime.

Back in February, at our last face-to-face board meeting, there was a vote to add member levels, as noted above, and as reported in the meeting minutes for this February meeting. To actually add these member levels however required a revision to our ByLaws to allow such. During the month of August, the board conducted a vote-by-mail of the board members for approval of the ByLaw revisions as proposed. The result of the vote was a unanimous approval from all responses.

These revised ByLaws are posted on the Cascade WoodTurners website, on the 'About Cascade' page. With that approval, the new member levels are now active and available on our website. A summary of these levels is included here, with some notes:

- 1. General Any single member annual fee \$35.00.
- 2. Student Students who are actively pursuing an educational degree annual fee \$10.00
- 3. Family Persons in a direct household including parents and children, not to exceed four members of the family annual fee \$45.00 per family. This is considered a 'bundle', and the Bundle Administrator must first apply and pay the annual fee; when approved, the bundle administrator can then log in and add the remainder of the bundle members.
- 4. Lifetime status granted by board approval only no annual fee.
