PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Our January meeting got off with a bang -- literally. In spite of that, Cascade is off to another good year. Glenn and Howard did an excellent job presenting and explaining hollow turning. This month, Steve Newberry will be showing us multi-axis turning. Next month, Andi Wolfe will be our presenter. Andi is recognized for her carving, surface enhancements and botanical motifs. **Remember – we have scheduled the meeting for MARCH 25th, THE FOURTH THURSDAY OF THE MONTH**. Andi's hands-on class filled very quickly, but there is space at her all-day demonstration Saturday, March 27th. In April, Malcom Zander will be with us and in May, Dick Sing. I will have sign up sheets available at the meeting, or you can send me an email. For June, we're planning to celebrate Cascade's 20th anniversary.

One of the books I pick up when the thought processes won't slow down is titled "*New Masters of Woodturning – Expanding the Boundaries of Wood Art*". It is a book with the works of 31 artists from all over the world. For most artists, there is a short section in which they discuss where their influences came from and what inspires them. Many were influenced by a family member. For others, their influence came from an earlier artist whose work they stumbled across and admired. They found their own style by taking elements from artists they admired and expanding on those to develop their own distinguishable style. Some are inspired by their physical environment – for example the Arizonan landscape of Virginian Dotson. Others, like Ron Layport, are inspired by forms and shapes found in living forms. Some find their inspiration from painters or sculptors. To Jacques Vesery, Fibonacci number sequences and the importance of form, scale, and balance are an inspiration.

Back in the days when I was a weaver and spinner, there were some exercises we used to devise weaving designs and color palettes. One was to take an object like a shell or rock and try to replicate the many subtle colors or textures found in the item. Another was to take a photo and then reduce it to its composite shapes and use those as the basis for a weaving. These same processes can be used in woodturning design. We can find ideas for color, form, and texture all around us. And as Joe Escriva showed with his wonderful zippered bowl, woodturning is limited only by your imagination. So where does you inspiration come from?

QUESTION & ANSWER GUY

For the new turners, let me mention a few words about which style of lathe to get if you plan on doing either hollowing work or bowls. In either case, leaning over the bed is bad for your back, and your back is your best friend, so minimize straining it. Standard lathes are basically spindle machines: headstock drives the spindle, tailstock supports the spindle, with the turner working on spindle standing in front of it. If you want to do bowls and hollow forms and take care of your back, get a lathe with one of the 4 following design features. Let me say that I have not turned on all four styles but have given this some thought. The styles are listed in my personal preference order, so the order is strictly my choice.

1. Sliding headstock feature. When turning spindles, the headstock is in its normal position: at the left of the bed. To do bowls or hollowing, slide the headstock to the right, leaving about 15" for bowls, or whatever works for a hollow form (like the club's Powermatic).

2. Short bed that attaches outboard. Turn spindles inboard. Shape the outside of hollow forms inboard. Turn bowls and complete hollow forms outboard (like large Oneway Lathes).

3. Swivel head lathes. The headstock swivels so a bowl can be hollowed without leaning over the bed (like some Nova lathes).

4. Short-bed lathes. These lathes are also called bowl-lathes. They have a short bed which makes them very limited for spindle work but great for bowls and hollow forms (like the Club's Woodfast).

5. Turning outboard with a free-standing tool rest. This was the solution for years, before lathes were commercially available with one of the first 4 styles. I consider this too unsafe and recommend members choose one of the styles 1-4 instead.

We have club members who have a lathe with the first 3 styles. Contact me and I'll get you a name of such an owner and you can invite yourself over to try out the design. Remember, before you buy a lathe you should have an idea of what you want to make on it. Then find the best lathe style that fits your needs and your budget. If it turns out you chose the wrong machine, sell it and get the right one. Some of us never get it right. I'm on my fourth lathe, it's my last lathe, and this time I mean it.

GOOD WOOD WEBSITES

If you have wanted to try a really tall goblet with a slender stem or an ornament that features extremely long thin icicles or finial here is the video for you. Eli Avisera posted a set of three short videos on You Tube demonstrating the turning of a string support. It is like a miniature center rest that supports the end of a very thin turning using string to limit any whip. The challenge was sorting the videos to see them in order from the thumb nail pictures on You Tube as they are captioned in Hebrew. I found them to be very useful even though I have absolutely no knowledge of the language.

LIBRARY CORNER

Our Club library has added a five volume DVD set by Eli Avisera titled "A Master's Course in Woodturning" Series 1 Beginning Level. If you have never had the privilege to see Eli present a demo or teach a hands on class, it is difficult to imagine his care at making your understanding of the turning process complete. These videos come close to an in person presentation. His videos show the details of his turning techniques as well as tool sharpening to attain the unique shape that is Eli's signature convex grind. There is a repeated message of safety while turning, which is also something Eli emphasizes in his classes.

TIP OF THE MONTH

101 Reasons NOT to Buy a Laguna Lathe (OK – so maybe only 99) by Skip Burke

I had only been learning to turn for about 6 months when I excitedly ordered a Laguna 18/24 Lathe –being assured by the Laguna salesman that it would be perfect for bowl turning.

On the agreed upon deliver date of October 1st—no lathe. I called Laguna and was told it would be shipped the following day after it was thoroughly quality checked. Four days later it finally arrived, missing a tool rest (so much for the quality check). Almost a week

later the missing tool rest arrived although it would not fit the lathe (post 1" SAE; receptacle less than 1" metric—a sign of more true quality?). While waiting for the corrected tool rest, I attempted to attach my One-way chuck only to discover it would not fit flush on the arbor.

One problem followed another including an inoperative locking screw on the tool rest holder, a tailstock that could not be removed from the bed without complete disassembly, plus others too many to list.

Speaking with Laguna, I was assured they would reimburse my out of pocket expenses in correcting their problems. Two and one-half months after initial delivery, I called to ask if a check for my itemized expenses was forthcoming; the next day, I received an email explaining I could have \$100 Laguna credit for my troubles. I had incurred far more than \$100 in expenses not to mention all the inconvenience.

At this point, I can only hope the power head has been better thought out than the rest of their lathe.

Personally, I give Laguna two thumbs down in the areas of "quality", "service" and "customer satisfaction." Only time will tell regarding the question of dependability.
