PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

I want to start with a thank you to Neil Seigel for his demonstration of making one-piece dippers. I got a lot of positive feed back ranging from those who couldn't wait to try it, on to those who had a better, read that as safer, way to do something similar, and finally those who admired the skill but where never going to make one. I find those all to be wonderful responses. It got people thinking a little outside of their comfort zone. I hope that happens with all of our demonstrations this year. It is all about possibilities; and you take the ones you want and disregard the rest.

There was also a very positive response to the April hands on class that Dave Schweitzer will be teaching. All six spaces were filled and there are two people on the waiting list in case any of the first six should drop out. I will be in contact with all of those who signed the list a little closer to the class date to make sure we have everything necessary for the class. In January, we asked our membership to vote approval of a plan to renew the 501(c)(3) status of the American Association of Woodturners in order to preserve the AAW as a nonprofit organization. This required us to file a new application with the Internal Revenue Service to bring the AAW into full compliance with current regulations. The IRS expedited our request and on January 13, 2012, approved the new corporation dating from November 14, 2011.

I am pleased to report that AAW members voted overwhelmingly in favor of the proposal. I have signed the Articles of Merger and they are being filed with the State of Minnesota. This resolves a paperwork issue that occurred some years ago, and allows us to continue our educational and fundraising programs.

I guess it all started as a teenager with my yearning for a Jaguar XK-150 and then a Mini Cooper S (the real one not the BMW remake). It continued with riding Triumph 650 Trophy and a Norton Atlas and even had a set of Whitworth wrenches. Now I glean all the turning tips I can from Allan and Stewart Batty, Melvin Firmager, Jimmy Clews, Mike Darlow, Ray Key, Stewart Mortimer, Chris Stott or Richard Raffan (yes he is English but lives down under). What tools do we hold as the quality to compare to? Try Sorby, Crown, Hamlet and Ashley Isles, all made by British craftsmanship in Sheffield. Look at our lathes for another English design, If you want more than a practical machine one only has to look at Poolwood or Silverdrive for great design that matches function. If you want truly simple beauty in tool design look at the Union Graduate lathe. The design may go back to the middle of the last century but it is still the best example of art deco influence on machinery I know

of. Yes I am an Anglophile and I haven't even mentioned Callard & Bowser toffees or Downton Abbey.

Layout of turning blanks and some partially turned ladles. Layout on the square stock

shows the bandsaw cut lines that remove a lot of mass to permit the offset turning without much vibration. The Trent Bosch carving post with chuck is used for final shaping after the ladle comes off the lathe.



There was trepidation in all the front row viewers at the off center handle spinning like a helicopter with a rotor blade disintegrating. Watching the ladle inside hollowing reminded me of seeing an oncoming car wreck but being unable to look away. Neil was very adept at keeping track of that spinning shaft and cautioned to keep fingers and sleeves inside the projected spinning cone when hollowing. The thin handle actually increases it's radius as centrifugal force pulls the end of the handle outward with increased lathe speed.



After steaming the handle in his home made teapot steamer, Neil clamps the ladle handle to a form to set the handle curve.



The end result is a graceful shape and a true keepsake yet utility turning.

LIBRARY CORNER

New books in the library: 'Woodturning Design' by Derek Hayes

I found the book to be the best overall introduction to the concept of woodturning design for vessels that I have seen. It isn't a 'how-to' on tools, wood or turning skills, but explains what you should think about before you pick up that roughing gouge.

Derek broke the subject of design into 3 logical sections to give a very clear primer on woodturning. The first is 'Principles' with basic art terms explained in relationship to woodturning. The explanations are in clear practical terms without deep esoteric philosophy. The second section is 'Practice' which covers some of the typical issues of open and closed forms and how they should be approached. The third section is 'Application' with examples of the wide range of possibilities to finish the pieces. Throughout the book he has given beautiful examples of various materials to illustrate the concepts. I would buy the book for the pictures alone, but the instructions are valuable to both beginners and experienced turners. David Williams

'Woodburning With Style' by Simon Easton

I have a number of woodburning/pyrographic instruction books. This one is a good choice for the turner as it covers not only the basic wood burning techniques but there are a number of examples on turned items. Most designs can be adapted to a turned shape. The new "burner" will enjoy the examples shown. This book will expand your embellishment ideas. A good read.

'Segmented Turning – Design, Techniques, Projects" by Dennis Keeling

Dennis has started out with an interesting history of polychromatic wood treatments that go back centuries and a tribute to recent turners that have advanced the segmented practices. The great difference in this book from others I have read is his treatment of open segmented work. Dennis has expanded upon Bill Smith's work with well illustrated details on assembling and turning open segmented turnings. This is a good book for the segmented fan that has not tried open work and a good read to see segmented examples for solid turners. Jerry Klug

COMING ATTRACTIONS

Cascade Woodturners:

Bill Moore, will demonstrate at our March meeting on the 15th. He will be showing us how to make shapes from wood that were first made from clay by the potter Hans Cooper. These will be non-symmetrical shapes made on the lathe.

April 19th meeting will have Dave Schweitzer showing us how he makes his wooden long necked hollowed bottles. Dave is known by most of us for his excellent tools from D-Way Tools, but in addition he is a very talented turner, teacher and demonstrator.

April 20th will have Dave teaching a hands on for up to six people on the design and making of hollow forms. He will cover the layout and carving of flutes as well as the design and making of finals to top the hollow forms. Dave makes some of the prettiest finals I have ever seen, and is capable of bringing you from someone who admires finials to someone who makes them. If there is time he will also help us to make the off center designs he adds to bowls and platters. This hands on will be at Dale's shop and there will be a \$90.00 charge for taking the class.

Saturday April 21st there will be an all day demonstration at Dale's by Dave Schweitzer on the various pieces he makes. There is a \$30.00 charge for this all day demo. In addition to other things we should be able to get him to show us how to use his beading tools and then Dale won't be the only one who can make beads on his bowls.

May 24th meeting (note date change to 4th Thursday) will have Stewart Mortimer turning fast and furious. Friday will be an all day hands on class and Saturday May 26th Stewart will be at Dale Larson's shop for an all day demo.
