Thanks to David Collier for his March presentation on kaleidoscope making. We can all appreciate his experiences on resources, making and marketing his kaleidoscopes. What struck me was the brilliance of the mirrors he uses.

This month our presenter is Stephen Hatcher. He'll be showing stone inlay. You can view examples of his work at http://www.stephenhatcher.com/, Real Mother Goose, and numerous books on woodturning. It promises to be an interesting presentation. He is offering a one day class, however the class is full.

Some of you may remember Graeme Priddle talking about "banana boxes" when he visited Cascade Woodturners several years. I did a small hands-on class in Brookings and then did the chapter demonstration for the monthly meeting of the Coos Bay chapter. At the end of the bowl turning demo I had the bowl in the wood jaws by its rim working on the foot. I explained to the chapter that a beginner should bring up the tailstock and secure the bowl to the wood jaws because it was safer. I also explained that my lathe didn't have a tailstock. I then started turning off the extra wood on the foot. As I got to the center I had a catch and threw the bowl off the lathe and over my head where it landed on the cement floor behind me. When it landed I heard the bad noise of a crack. It took a chunk out of the rim. Lessons in life: Use the tailstock when you can (an maybe you won't look like a fool in front of a room of turners).

MARCH'S DEMO

David Collier's demonstration was an eye opening trip on the design opportunities with a single theme. The variety of kaleidoscopes he showed were amazing. I can still remember the first kaleidoscope I looked through. A pretty simple one that came from the five and dime store. That sure dates me. It was a red and blue cardboard tube with a small open hole for the eye lens and a frosted cell containing colored chips. I have been fascinated with the kaleidoscope ever since.

The popularity of kaleidoscopes is easy to gage. If you Google "kaleidoscope" you will get a listing of 7,020,000 sites. There I everything from directions to making a kids project using old CD/DVD discs for the mirrors to very sophisticated galleries. The Brewster Society (www.brewstersociety.com) has a lot of history and some good diagrams to illustrate the effect of the number of mirrors used as well as the angle they are set.

When you embark on your first kaleidoscope project, you may want to find a kit or suppliers that can furnish a few of the essentials. The front surfaced mirrors are available from numerous sources on the web and locally from Cline Glass Company in Portland www.clineglasscompany.com. They have stores on Grand and on Stark. The cell or chamber will be a turning project in itself and will determine the dimensions of your scope as well as whether to have the chamber dry or fluid filled. David's practice was to use mineral oil with the objects in the chamber around half filling the cell. Using a lens that has around 2.5 magnification allows the scope (and mirrors) to be shorter and still let the viewer see the image clearly. The lens also keeps the dust out of the scope. David makes the objects from polymer clay available as Sculpey or FIMO, from craft suppliers

like Michaels. David forms the shapes in many colors and bakes them to stabilize the pieces. You can use anything from glass and stone to paper. I saw a lovely double disc kaleidoscope that had pressed dry flower petals in the glass discs. The image of all natural colors with a soft nearly opaque image was memorable. Your imagination is your guide.

TIP OF THE MONTH

When wrapping bowls with a paper bag after soaking them in alcohol I found it easier to use a large rubber band instead of masking tape. This is easier and gives a tighter seal than wrestling with tape. It is also easier to inspect your bowl periodically and re warp if necessary. I like to use a grocery bag, cut it so the rim of the bowl can be covered and place the bowl in the bag. Slip the rubber band over the bag and then all that is left is to tuck the paper around the rim and tape the inside of the bowl.
