QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

I received several responses to my request for input on deep hollowing tools, so here is a summary.

The deep hollowing systems need two basic components: the bar that holds the cutter and the stabilizer that keeps the bar from twisting when the cutter engages the wood. Several turners made their own stabilizer. I made mine from 1" square steel tubing and Glenn Burki used hardwoods.

Glenn purchased the Lyle Jamieson 'D' handle, which has a hole in the end for 3/4" tools. Glenn then uses Dennis Stewart tools in the D handle. My homemade bar also takes 3/4" tools, so I use Dennis Stewart tools as well as some homemade ones. As long as the end of the tool is 3/4" it will work in either bar. Another turner made adapters for smaller diameter tools. So his 1/2" diameter tools fits into the adapter that has a 1/2" hole at one end and is 3/4" in diameter at the other end to fit the deep bar.



As you can see in the picture, the Jamieson D handle allows for a depth of close to 2 feet. Several of us have made bars that are longer. It's entirely up to the user. If you've never done this, two feet deep is challenging enough, so starting with the Jamieson handle won't limit your turning for the first few years.



Glenn's photo also shows his homemade laser holder. It's simple and works well. Mine is not so simple and also works well. If anyone would like more details, feel free to contact me with questions or we can schedule a visit to see mine set up on my lathe. I suspect Glenn will be as generous with information about his system.

TIP OF THE MONTH

When turning bowls or other objects that I use the same height on my tool rest for the inside and outside, I sometimes find it difficult to maintain the exact height when moving, or turning the tool rest. I noted on my Drill wizard, by Oneway, it has a 1" ISD (inside diameter) the same as my tool rest shaft. I called Oneway, (1-800-565-7288) and ask if one could purchase just collars. I was informed they are not in there catalog, however one can purchase then at \$3.00 each, plus SH. I ordered 5, my total cost was \$22.50. They shipped right away, great people to deal with.



JULY'S DEMO

Bill Moore made spinning metal look easy. He did caution that the lathe spindle bearings take a different loading than when cutting wood and the bigger and more widely spaced the bearings are the better. Bill made a simple tool rest with multiple pin holes so that the fulcrum pin could be located as needed. His tool was a highly polished and shaped like the end of a finger, with multiple radii. He made a hard wooden form with a small flat, about the size of a quarter. The live center has a flat to match. The metal is lubricated with glycerin soap that has to be cleaned up after spinning to prevent corrosion of the tools. To spin form the metal he starts in the center and deforms the metal onto the wooden form plug. It all looked easy. The speed is low (300 RPM) and the results are quick. Bill uses 18 ga. Cu. As it is formed the metal will work harden and will have to be heated to a dull cherry red and cooled to anneal the metal. The deeper the form the more frequent annealing is required.

Our library has a video by Sorby that demonstrated metal spinning with their tools. They are a bit more complicated than the onus Bill successfully spins with.
