SECRETARYS NOTE PAD


If anyone is missing an Ashley hardwood bottom bowl gouge, please contact me to acquire same.

GREAT BASIC WOODTURNING

BUMBLING TOWARD A SALAD SERVER BY HARVEY ROGERS





It was a mass-produced wooden spoon made from a light-colored wood like birch. My wife uses them to mix and serve salad.

It was the perfect project for me. It was: (1) not very hard; (2) has round parts that can be turned; and, (3) so ordinary I might be able to make something better.

My first try was out of ¾" cherry. I couldn't resist adding curves and burn lines like Howard Borer just showed me in his excellent class at Franklin High. The result was OK, but too spindly; besides, it took a lot of time to carve the bowl by hand.

My next attempt used a piece of 1 ¾" cherry I had left over from another project. I measured and calculated I had enough to cut two blanks. I cut the wood in half and cut one half into the shape of a "T" with a really fat top and a small square extension in the middle of the top that fit my four-jaw chuck. Just as I had with my first try, I turned the entire length of the server.

Since the salad server would only be grabbing chunks instead of scooping liquid, I decided I didn't need to carve a real bowl and could cut just cut the "bowl" part with the bandsaw.


That was when I realized I should not have turned the entire length of the server. When I put the side of the server on the bandsaw table, the curved made it hard to hold the blank steady, and I was lucky to cut the server more or less where I intended. I sanded the back, front and edges of the bowl on my spindle sander and cut the "claws" freehand on my scroll saw. It looked like this:



I showed it to my wife and she liked it, but the handle was too short and the cone at the top of the handle dug into her wrist when she served salad. Trying to save wood, I had cut the blank too short.

I cut another blank with a longer handle and chucked it up. This time I only turned the handle, so I would have a flat side to rest on the bandsaw table when I cut the side of the bowl. When the lathe spun the blank the corners at the top of the bowl tried to eat my knuckles and interfered with turning the bottom cone on the handle. For my next blank I cut the corners off the top of the "bowl."

The blank looked like this:

To cut the "bowl" on the bandsaw I first cut the side. The flat on the side of the bowl really helped keep the blank steady on the table while I sawed it. Making the cuts on the face was harder, but I finally learned to lay the server face down on the bandsaw table and cut on the back, so the extension at the top of the "T" would rest on the firmly on the table.

For my first few attempts I cut the curves on the back of the bowl freehand. Since I was trying to cut matched pairs of servers I decided to lay out the curves using a compass. That was better, so I copied those curves onto thin cardboard and used that as a template for the next tries.

I had trouble figuring out how to transition the bowl to the handle. I ended up deciding the servers looked best if I turned a slight curve on the very top of the bowl, but cut the rest of the bowl curves on the bandsaw. This picture shows the transition from the handle to the bowl:



I wasn't satisfied with the way the claws on my first salad server looked, so I drew an arc from the bottom center of the "bowl" with a compass, and drilled small holes at even intervals along the arc. I cut from the edge to the holes; the result looked much neater. I transferred the hole pattern to the thin cardboard template, and drilled and cut several more servers. Then I realized I was cutting four holes and really only needed three.

While I can name at least a dozen flaws or "seriously needs improvements" for this bunch of salad servers, my wife was thrilled; she even gave a pair away as a wedding gift and they got extravagant compliments.

This picture shows the first spindly spoon in the center (including the sloppy power sanding on the bottom cone), a pair of salad servers turned from cherry, and a pair turned from some curly maple I got from a fellow in Portland who recycles urban trees.



Harvey Rogers did a bit of turning about 20 years ago, but "life" intervened and he is just now getting back into it. He joined Cascade a few months ago and is reading everything about turning he can find. He realized that most articles on turning seem to be written by well-organized people who figure out how to turn their entire project before they turn on the lathe, and then follow through flawlessly to conclusion. He thought CWA members might enjoy reading about a turner who learned from his mistakes, and ended up producing something that made others happy.

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
