DALE'S CORNER

We had 10 turners here for open shop Sept 26th. A couple of bowls were rough turned, one finish turned and one box was turned. Four lathes were running with projects. We did some chainsaw work to make big wood smaller. We will have open shop Oct 31 starting at 9:30. Bring your tools and a project.

News from AAW. AAW will be going to 6 journals a year starting this February. This is about a \$70,000 increased cost to AAW but it was the top request from our members. The AAW board voted to raise annual dues by \$3/year. This will bring in about \$40,000. The rest of the increased journal costs will come from budget cuts elsewhere. The Albuquerque symposium was well received. We had about 1300 turners there. The vendor show was great. The vendors reported sales of big ticket items was slow but smaller items were selling well. The silent/live auction grossed about \$102,000 on 142 items. All of the profits from the auction will be handed out in EOG grants this coming spring. The board is getting ready for the fall board meeting where we will be taking up the Hartford symposium and next year's budget. The symposium next year will be in Hartford, Connecticut on June 17-20, 2010. We have a great list of demonstrators lined up and will complete the roster within a month. The Fall 2009 American Woodturner magazine has both the ballot to vote for board member seats that are open and the annual renewal form. The ballot must be postmarked by October 21st so get your ballot turned in and renew your AAW membership. Any questions call Dale 503-661-7793.

BARGAIN BIN

This section of your newsletter is to spotlight useful items for your turning enhancement that are not found at the typical woodworking outlets. Please feel free to send me your bargain discoveries and share them with the club.

Joe Escriva had a great idea for adding a stop collar to your tool post to maintain constant height settings that was shown in the July Turning Times. Jim Hall suggested that there might be local suppliers of the stop collars so I did some checking. My local Ace Hardware has both 5/8 and ¾ inch stop collars in the pulley section for \$1.98 each. Tacoma Screw Products at 2797 NE Columbia Blvd. in Portland has 5/8 inch for \$0.85, ¾ inch for \$1.04 and 1 inch for \$1.49. All of these are aluminum collars with an allen set screw.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question: What is tear out, how do I prevent it, and how do I get rid of it if I have some? The question about tear out warrants a book, but I'll be as brief as possible.

Answer: To me, tear out is that rough grain left on the surface of a turning, most often on end grain and most often on dry wood. It is caused when the wood fibers are broken off and not cut off. That's why this usually happens on dry end grain.

There are a few steps to lessen the problem. Wiping the area with paste wax or wetting it with oil helps to soften the fibers, thus making it easier to cut them and they will be less likely to break. The most important things to keep in mind are:

- a. Always turn in the proper direction. When spindle turning, cut from large diameter to small. Want to see tear out? Cut from small diameter to large on a dry spindle piece. When turning bowls that are oriented the "normal" bowl way, that is, the grain of the wood is 90 degrees to the lathe bed, turn the outside of the bowl from foot to rim and the inside from rim to bottom of bowl.
- b. To avoid tear out, or clean it up when you get some, go sharpen your tool. Then feed the tool slower into the wood. Pushing too hard on a bowl gouge does not give the tool a chance to cut the fiber, resulting in breaking the fiber, or tear out. Same thing on the last cut of any turning: sharpen the tool and slow down the tool's feed rate. You'll get a much nicer, cleaner surface.
- c. There are several other cutting techniques that help clean up a soon-to-be finished surface. Shear cutting can do wonders to a surface. On the outside of a bowl, use a flat scraper, freshly sharpened, with the bottom edge on the tool rest, with the tool tilted at 45 degrees to the wood, and pulled in the proper direction, (foot to rim) with a 45 degree angle between the bowl and the tool. It's easier to show this then describe, so ask any experienced turner to demonstrate this. On the inside of the bowl, use a freshly sharpened round nose scraper to shear cut from rim to bottom, also tilted at 45 degrees and pulled at 45 degrees to the bowl in the direction of travel. Whether inside or outside, take light cuts with a slow feed rate.

TIP OF THE MONTH

SPALTED WOOD

Spalted wood, also known as "lined wood," "zone-lined wood," "calico wood" and undoubtedly other names, is decayed wood in which the activities of one or more fungi are visually delimited. The fungus forms a sac or delimiting structure composed of dark fungal threads (hyphae) and also dark infiltrated wood cells. Apparently, the fungus walls out competing fungi—either different species or different colonies of the same species—from its sphere of wood decay activity. When multiple sacs are formed in a bolt of wood, sectioning with a saw or lathe exposes black or brown lines. Imagine one or more paper sacs that have been somewhat crushed, then sectioned. You can then imagine the elaborate patterns that will emerge. Spalted wood is decayed, usually extensively. If decay is not too far advanced it can be cut or shaped into beautiful small objects that do not require much strength. A number of fungal can create spalted wood, some on angiospermous wood (hardwood), some on gymnospermous wood (coniferous wood or softwood), and a few on both hardwood and softwood.

Jack D. Rogers, Professor of Plant Pathology, Washington State University

Jack Rogers, a 44-year member of the WSU faculty and Regents professor, teaches classes in forest pathology, advanced mycology and a course on fungi.

Rogers is a well-known researcher. He is author of more than 200 journal articles, many book chapters and a book. He received a WSU Sahlin award for research, scholarship and the arts, and he is the 2006 Eminent Faculty Award winner. The Mycological Society of America presented him with the Distinguished Mycologist Award and the W.H. Weston award for teaching excellence.

SPALTED WOOD TURNING RISKS

Spalted wood is just as dangerous to your lungs as inhaling walnut or lacewood dust. Because spalted wood contains fungus, it can be dangerous to those who have respiratory issues or severe allergies to mold. There are reports of eye fungus developing from turning spalted wood. Although spalting is only dangerous to a select few it is always recommended to wear eye protection and a dust mask just to be safe!

SPALT YOUR OWN WOOD

Russ Fairfield creates his own spalting by treating freshly cut maple, birch, beech, sweetgum, oak, alder, holly, or pecan with a brew he has concocted. His home "brew" is a diluted mixture of both commercial and natural fertilizers, beer, ammonia and decomposing oak leaves. He paints the ends of the wood and keeps it warm to promote the growth of the fungus into the wood grain.
