<u>Safety in the shop:</u> We all take chances including myself. This does not make it right. Read on.....

This came off of Lynne Yamaguehi's blog..... "I had a terrible accident with my lathe last Friday afternoon, September 21. A large (10-inch-diameter), heavy, partially hollowed mesquite vessel came apart while rotating at about 1200 rpm (too fast, I know). I knew the wood was cracked, and I had wrapped the outside with duct tape, but apparently not enough to hold it together. I didn't even get a catch, wasn't even touching a tool to the wood: the crack just gave. The vessel

broke into three pieces; I think one piece split when it hit the wall. The piece that hit me weighs a little over a kilogram (about 2-1/2 lbs). I had removed my face shield, so only my half-mask respirator and glasses (with polycarbonate lenses) were between me and the wood. Pretty much all of the bones in the left half of my face were fractured."

Lynne still does not know if she will regain any of her eye sight in her left eye.

With all the wood you will be hauling home from the auction here is some good advice for keeping it:

Dale Larson's Method for Drying Bowls

Time of Year. I prefer to get my wood from November to May. That way it is stable before the hot weather gets here. Wet wood is always the top priority. It never gets better. It just cracks and rots. Spalting in maple can be nice if you can control it but the fungus and mold take the shine out of the wood.

Air drying. Easy woods to dry: Maple burl and black walnut. Hard to dry: madrone, cherry with sapwood, apple. Most of the fruit woods are challenging to dry without cracking.

- ❖ I rough out the bowls. You have to leave them thick enough that when they dry there is still a round left in the blank. Leave it too thick and it can't move and more likely to crack. The usual rule of thumb is to leave the thickness 1/10 the diameter.
- ❖ After they are roughed out I paste wax the end grain. Then I date the bottom and mark the name where I got the tree. So I can track every bowl from each tree.
- Next, I stack them on dry stickers so they don't touch each other. If you stack wet bowls on each other they will spalt.
- ❖ I watch the bowls every day for about two weeks. You'll learn quickly if they wood is stable. This is in my unheated shop. If it is stable I check is less frequently. After 6 weeks most woods are stable and won't crack after that.

Two things to watch for:

- 1. Cracking. This tells you the wood is drying too fast. The outside wood is drying and needs to move, the interior wood is still wet and can't move. It cracks. If this happens you need to slow down the drying. I super glue the crack and pack the bowl in a plastic bag with dry chips. The dry chips soak up the free moisture. Replace chips as needed. This re-equalizes the blank. The blank won't crack if moisture content remains stable.
- 2. Mold. This means the wood is drying too slow. I move it into my heated room for a few hours. Need to get it surface dry. If you leave it too long it will crack. Spray with bleach. How long to dry: Maple burl and madrone in 6-8 months. White and black oak 2 years. Wood teaches you patience.

Pipeline. Cut, rough, dry and finish your bowl stock to fit your turning schedule. Plan for your bowl turning long enough in advance so that you have dried roughed out blanks ready to finish when you want them. The pipeline approach will provide a supply of ready to finish blanks at the same rate as you finish your bowls.

Boiling. I rough out the blanks and put them in my stainless steal tank. Boil for at least 2 hours. Leave in water until can reach in and take it out. Cherry and apple also works. Negative. Boiling takes out the anti fungal element. More likely to spalt. Bad in madrone.

PEG. Big end grain pieces. Two big negatives. Attracts water and very limited choice of finishes as some popular finishes will not adhere to PEG treated wood.

Alcohol. Soak and dry. Three negatives: makes wood hard, expensive and a fire danger.

Soap. No need. Attracts water.

Kiln. Kiln drying makes wood harder. Easiest way is refrigerator. Phil Lapp loves his.

Vacuum kiln. Best way, dries wood from inside out. Tropical hardwoods.

Freezing. Bill Luce says makes some wood stringy. Takes a long time. Can store wet wood.

Microwave. Best for drying thin stuff with movement. Remember dries from inside out. Microwave drying requires constant watching, ff you see smoke, the inside is burned. It takes a long time for a regular thickness roughed out blank.

SEPTEMBER CHALLENGE

September was another poor showing for the Challenge with only one entry. There is no challenge for October, just lots of fun and hopefully high bidding for auction items. Plan ahead for November and bring lots of new ornaments to display.

SEPTEMBER DEMO



Eric Lofstrom showed the club how to turn a natural edge bowl thin enough to transmit light through the wood.

Eric emphasized safety, correct body position and movement as well as proper tool work. Always stand out of the "blast zone" and reduce the lathe speed when starting the lathe. The blast zone is the area that the wood could fly if coming off its mounting. Body position should be where your feet are spread for a solid stance and your tool movement is supported with moving your knees and body instead of your arms. Tools should be very sharp and anchored to the tool rest. The cut should begin when the bevel is in contact with the wood and the tool handle is lifted until the shavings start to peal over the edge of the tool. Eric's reminder is "ABCD'S" for Anchor, Bevel, Cut, Direct attention, 'Shavings give feedback.

After the outside shape is turned, the inside is cut out in layers. At each layer the thickness is turned thin using a light to determine the thickness by the translucent color of the wood. Once a layer is removed to a thinness you want, you start the next level. You NEVER go back to the thin portion of the bowl. The turning took up the 90 minutes of the demonstration. On the Saturday all day demo, Eric turned another

similar bowl in 20 minutes from start to finish with no talking.

Eric's website has a four page color PDF in the resource/links page that you can print showing tips on turning translucent bowls. He has a number of other useful instructions there also.
